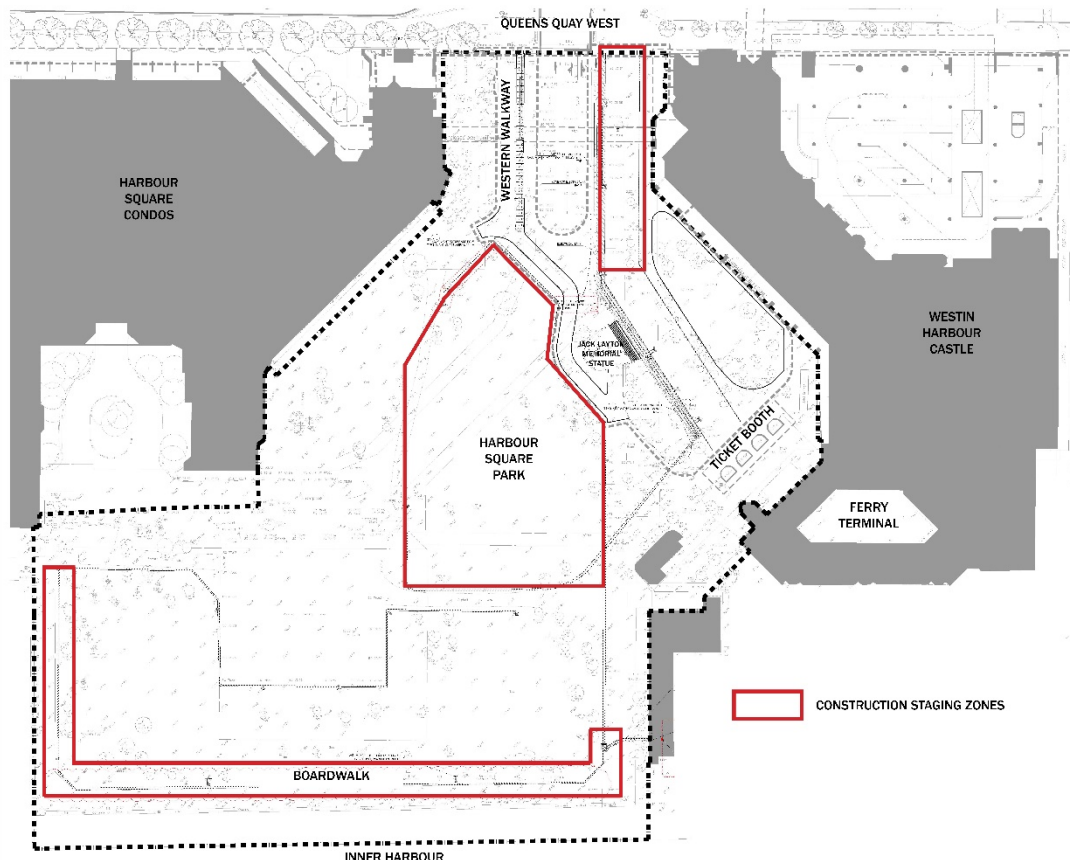
## CONSTRUCTION NOTICE #7: Jack Layton Ferry Terminal and Harbour Square Park

Construction on Phase 1A of the Jack Layton Ferry Terminal and Harbour Square Park project is scheduled to resume on October 9, 2018.

This spring, our priority was to ensure that the public had uninterrupted access to the Toronto Island Park during the summer season. In May 2018, construction was suspended, and the entrance promenade was re-opened for public use. With the high-traffic season now behind us, construction crews are ready to re-mobilize and complete the remaining 30 metres of the entrance promenade including the granite mosaic paving, seven new trees, and updated lighting throughout Harbour Square Park.

### What to Expect During Construction

Construction hoarding will be placed around three zones within the site. The map below shows where the hoarding will be placed at various stages during construction. Please note area boundaries are approximate.



During construction, visitors are asked to access the ferry terminal gates from Bay Street and Queens Quay using the western walkway. Signs will be placed on site to help visitors navigate their way to and from the ferry terminal and park.

Periodically, trucks will need to cross the Queens Quay pedestrian promenade and Martin Goodman Trail at Bay Street in order to enter and exit the site. During these times, flagmen will be on site to safely direct pedestrians and cyclists.

When complete, Phase 1A of the Jack Layton Ferry Terminal will feature a 106-linear metre promenade leading visitors south from Bay Street to the ferry terminal gates and ticket booths. The promenade will include a two-tone granite maple leaf mosaic that unifies the space with the revitalized Queens Quay, along with improved views of the water's edge from Bay Street. It will also feature a shaded archway formed by a double row of trees down the promenade and new lighting throughout the park and along the promenade.

Construction is scheduled to be completed in January 2019. Due to winter planting restrictions, the seven new trees will be planted in April 2019.
